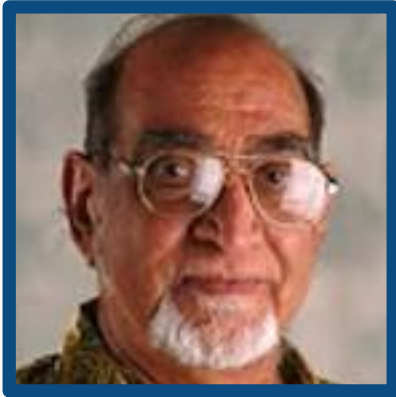

National Teachers Training Programme

IN SERVICE SKILLS UP-GRADATION CLINIC FOR TEACHERS

As has been noted worldwide, education plays a pivotal role in empowerment of various sections of the society. In tandem with this thought, we introduced **“In Service Skills Up-gradation Clinic for Teachers”** across various educational institutes in India. In the pilot phase, the target group identified is the primary school teachers.

Through this clinic we aim at supplementing the existing intellectual infrastructure with the required support and information to enrich the classroom interactions and bring about a critical change towards quality education. The course and activities have been carefully designed and customized by subject experts to address and fill the gaps between policy making and implementation at primary school level. The trainees will undergo a rigorous and comprehensive schedule that includes sensitizing and orienting them towards the learning needs, participatory pedagogical techniques and effective evaluation of school going children belonging to the target age-group of 6-11 years. It is noteworthy here that the focus goes beyond training teachers to handle the curriculum and include physical, cognitive and psycho-social development integrally in classroom environment.

The inauguration of the three Days National Teachers Training Programme “In Service Skills Up-gradation Clinic was held on 09th November, 2014 at the Conference Hall, Indian Social Institute, 10, Institutional Area, Lodi Road, New Delhi. The Confederation will conduct the training as a pilot programme initially in 20 states and 2500 teachers are expected to be trained in one pilot project and target groups are those who are not getting ample opportunities.

Prof. Akhtarul Wasey, National Commissioner for Linguistic Minorities, Ministry of Minority Affairs, Govt. of India graced the occasion as the Chief Guest of the Inaugural Session and other eminent distinguished guests, **Prof. Mohammad Akhtar Siddiqui** (Former Chairman, NCTE, New Delhi & Professor, Faculty of Education, Jamia Millia Islamia, New Delhi); **Dr. Anita Nuna** (Associate Professor, Department of Gender Studies, NCERT, New Delhi) and **Adv. Siddiqui, Chairman, National Commission for Minority Educational Institutions, Govt. of India graced as the Chief Guest.

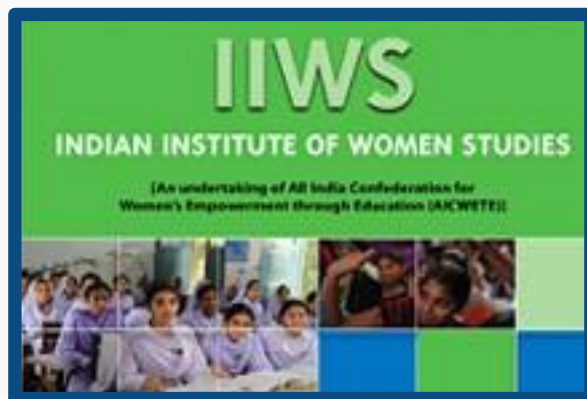
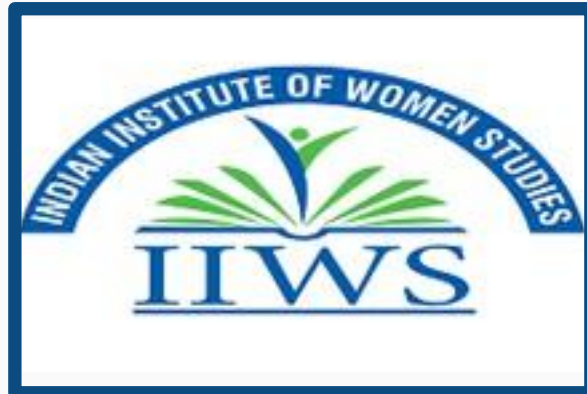

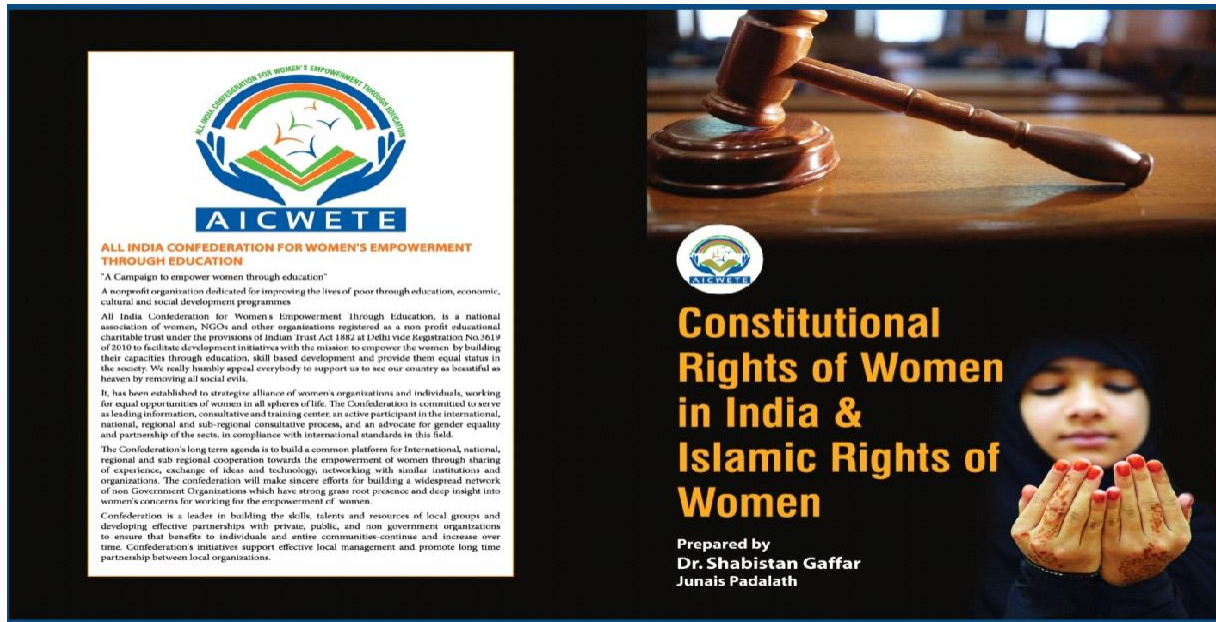

The theme of the Seminar was to educate women on how to strengthen the minority women of the area through micro credit and micro-financing scheme, how to make saving, loans and repayment, training & capacity building and also to provide maximum awareness about the schemes and other welfare projects provided by the National Minorities Development Finance Corporation. It also aimed to:

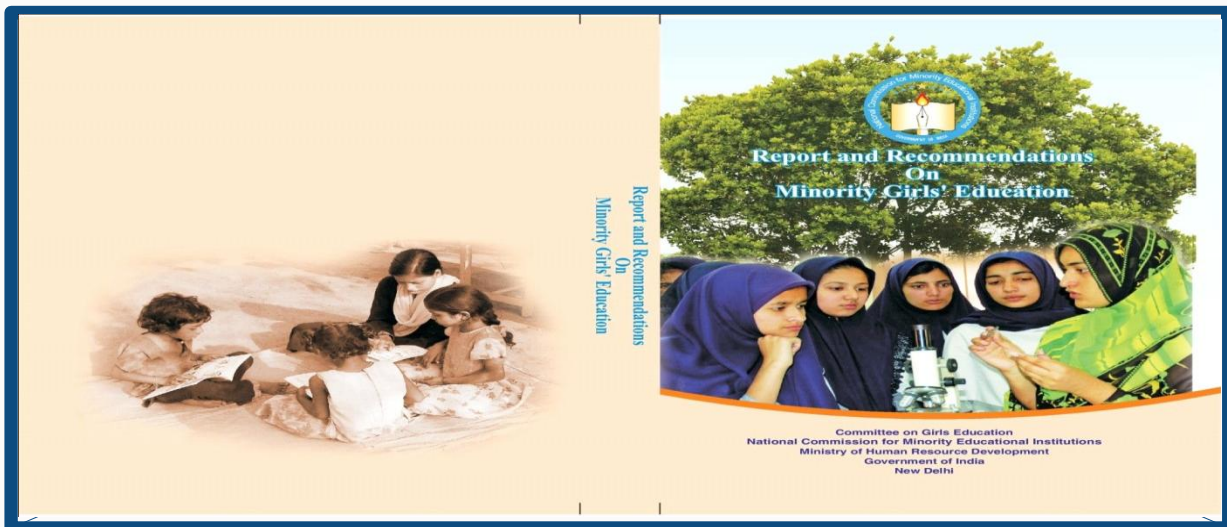
MERITORIOUS SCHOLARSHIP AND CERTIFICATE TO STUDENTS FOR THEIR ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Siddiqui, Chairman, National Commission for Minority Educational Institutions, Govt. of India was the Special Guest of the function. Eminent personalities from different parts of India like bureaucrats, educationalists, social activist, heads of NGO etc. participated at the function.

Smt. Mamta Sharma, Hon'ble Chairperson, made a splendid inaugural address. She highlighted that the importance of women education and stated that literacy does not mean education the society's mind set up should change. She said that the even after the completion of 66 years of independence, the women in India are not safe. She stated one important fact that the female foeticide is very high among the educated people in urban area than the poor people in the villages. The women are having a sixth sense to analyse the things and they have very long time vision and highlighted that women are having 29% high i.q. level than men. She urged that to control women trafficking and molestation more women should join wonderful programme.



III. DISASTER RELIEF AND REHABILITATION

'EDUCATIONAL REHABILITATION OF STRIFE-AFFECTED STUDENTS OF District BTAD, Assam

To educationally rehabilitate the Strife Affected students of violence in Bodoland Territorial Area District (BTAD) in Assam the All India Confederation for Women's Empowerment Through Education (AICWETE), New Delhi in collaboration with ERD Foundation, Guwahati, Assam initiated the project "Centre for Educational Rehabilitation". In this regards the Confederation organized a discussion conclave on 'Educational rehabilitation of strife-affected students of BTAD' on 8th September, 2012 at the Regional Institute of Science & Technology (RIST), Meghalaya, on the outskirts of Guwahati on Saturday. Over 100 heads of leading educational groups, representatives of NGOs, social workers and activists, corporate heads, opinion leaders and philanthropists from across the country, particularly Kerala, Tamil Nadu, Karnataka, Andhra Pradesh, Magarashtra, Bihar, Gujarat, Uttar Pradesh, Delhi, West Bengal and North Eastern states attended the conclave.

The project was flagged from Guwahati on 14th November, 2012 at 11 am. By his Excellency Shri R.S. Moshahary, the Governor of Meghalaya who himself hails from BTAD in the presence of Justice MSA Siddiqui, Chairman, NCMEI, Ministry of HRD, Govt of India.



SUPPORT FROM AICWETE

i. Financial aid and & Scholarship to continue study:

- Scholarships amounting to Rupees 9 lakhs were distributed to 150 students affected by the strife towards six month post-metric scholarships at the rate of Rs.1000 per month.

ii. Adoption (Primary to Higher Secondary :

- Rehabilitated 450 students upto secondary level through various educational institutions in different parts of country at the rate of Rs. 36000/- per annum (@3000 p.m.).

iii. Established one Girls Degree College at Assam

- Established one degree college, Khairun Neesa Women's Degree College at Badarpur, District Karimganj, Assam in association with ERD Foundation, Guwahati, Assam mainly for the children, who are victims of strife.

RELIEF AND REHABILITATION OF THE FLOOD VICTIMS IN KASHMIR

This was the worst flood Kashmir has witnessed in over a century. The flood has taken lives, destroyed livelihood, demolished public and private assets, and devastated the State economy. Along with the sad loss of lives of over 500 people across J&K, Kashmir has suffered damage to infrastructure and business of over one lakh Crore. A total of 2600 villages are affected, with 1700 in Kashmir and the rest in Jammu. Over 390 areas were fully submerged and 1225 partially, resulting in colossal damage to housing and business sectors. On an average, every affected house has suffered a damage of more than 10 lakhs.

More than 100 people from different parts of Kashmir along with our 20 volunteers worked hardly for the relief and rescue operation.

Strategy

The President and Secretary of the Confederation visited Kashmir on 17th September, 2014 to study the situation deeply and chalk out a plan for the rehabilitation of victims.

Financial Support

- Total of Rs. 35 lakhs was distributed through cheques and cash to the identified 140 flood victims, belonging to the economically weaker section. This amount would mostly be utilized for minor repairs to the damaged houses mainly in the following areas:-

REHABILITATION

SHELTER HOMES

With the forthcoming winter season, it is extremely important that the families whose shelters have been significantly damaged and are unlivable are provided with alternative shelter. There is an urgent need for provision of weather proof emergency shelter kits (including winterized tents) reconstruction of permanent shelters or transitional shelters (using pre-fabricated material) to the affected families.

The Confederation supported some families. The budget for each temporary shed is Rs.50,000/- per temporary shed.

Food grains

As the State Government provides only 35 kgs of rice grain, which is insufficient for a month for a family, most of the businessmen have sent their employees on long leave without pay or fired them due to the loss suffered. Also, there are no tourists in the valley, tourism is one of the major means of Kashmir's economy.

- A significant proportion of children affected by disaster are school-going. It is imperative that we ensure continuation of learning opportunities for children and youth affected by the disaster. The following interventions are needed on urgent basis: - establish temporary learning/ education centers (makeshift schools). - provide education material/kits including school bags, uniform for children who lost education material - establish child clubs at school and community level to ensure that the children presently out of school and orphans are enrolled again in the schools. In the longer run, the damaged schools (fully or partially damaged) will need to be taken up for reconstruction/ restoration. A complete list of school buildings that have been partially/ fully damaged is being compiled by the local administration and will be made available to AICWETE. Education assistance such as school fee, stationery, bags etc. Schools need to be identified where lower middle class students study. As per the info available, schools will resume from March 2015.

The Confederation is committed to serve as leading information, consultative and training center, an active participant in the international, national, regional and sub regional consultative process and an advocate for gender equality and partnership of the sects, in compliance with international standers in this field. The programme witnessed a large crowd of more than 400 people, particularly Muslim women from different parts of India, and stakeholders of minority educational institutions, bureaucrats, social activists, educationalists, journalists, teachers, lawyers etc.

Siddiqui, Chairman, National Commission for Minority Educational Institutions, Govt. of India, New Delhi graced the occasion as the Chief Guest and delivered a splendid inaugural address. WORKSHOP ON “STRENGTHENING THE SHG GROUPS AND ITS SCALABILITY FOR LARGER EMPOWERMENT OF MINORITY AND UNDERPRIVILEGED WOMEN IN HOWRAH

A workshop on the topic Strengthening the SG Groups and its scalability for larger employment of minority and underprivileged women in Howrah was organized by the All India Confederation for Women's Empowerment Through Education, New Delhi in collaboration with Samaritan Help Mission

Right now under the initiative of Samaritan Help Mission almost 350 women have been covered within 1 ½ years of the establishment of SHG Project. The workshop on **“strengthening the SHG groups and its scalability for larger empowerment of Minority and underprivileged women in Howrah** was organized to make the program more consolidated and scaling up and to mobilize more minority and underprivileged women to come under the fold of SHG's Umbrella.



More than 300 people including the educationalists, research scholars, school managements, social workers, activists, media persons, community leaders, representatives of educational and policymaking bodies, etc participated in the programme.

The envisaged objectives of the national seminar were as follows:

- To promote economic and developmental activities for the benefit of "Backward Sections" amongst the minorities, particularly, occupational groups and women;
- To promote self-employment and other ventures for the benefits of minorities;

To provide awareness about the loans and advances providing by the NMDFC at such rates of interest as may be determined from time to time in accordance with the guidelines or schemes prescribed by the Central Government or by the Reserve Bank of India.

- To provide awareness about the loans and advances of the NMDFC to the eligible members belonging to the minorities for pursuing general/professional/technical education or training at graduate and higher levels.
- To assist in the upgradation of technical and entrepreneurial skills of minorities for proper and efficient management of production units.
- To assist the State level organisations dealing with the development of the minorities by way of providing financial assistance or equity contribution and in obtaining commercial funding or by way of refinancing



V. MINORITY RIGHTS

The Confederation has worked tremendously for empowering the minority educational institutions in India. It has organised hundreds of seminars and workshops in different parts of the country on the 'educational rights of minorities in India'. Through the concerted efforts of Confederation thousands of educational institutions received minority status certificate from the National Commission for Minority Educational Institutions and many problems facing by the minority educational institutions in India, such as NOC for starting Medical, Engineering and Other professional colleges and NOC for starting centrally affiliated CBSE and ICSE institutions; recognition from Central and State Board, appointment of teaching and non-teaching staffs, government grants to institutions, affiliation to university, up-gradation of schools, etc, have been solved.

SWACHH BHARAT ABHIYAN PROGRAMME AT NEW VISION PUBLIC SCHOOL

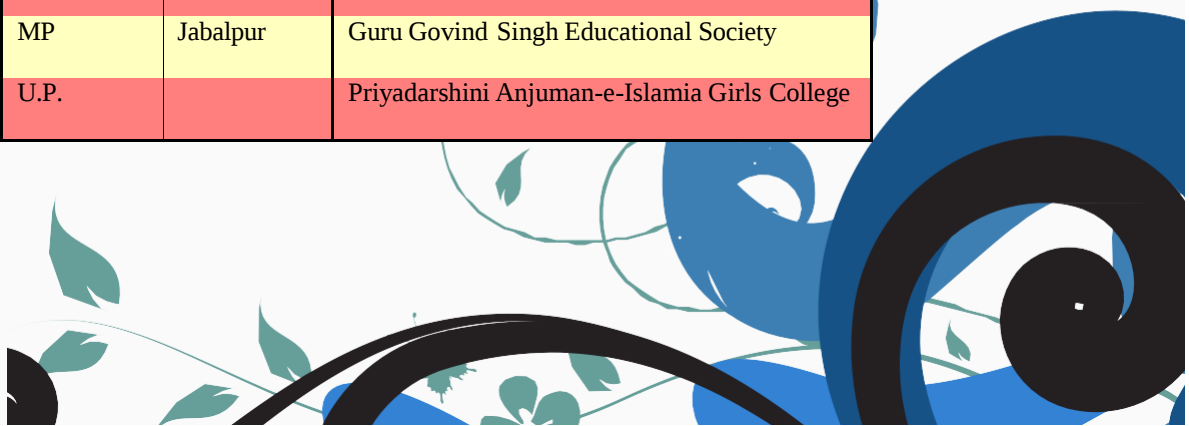
